in the morning with a knot in the pit of your stomach because there are people at school who pick on you, tease you, or try to shove you around?



f it were just a bad dream, you could pull the covers back over your head and never get out of bed. But it's not a dream — it's real and it's happening to you.

You are being bullied.

How do you know what bullying is? Sometimes it's hard to tell. Bullying can include calling you names, making things up to get you into trouble, hitting, and shoving. It can happen anywhere: at school, at the mall, even online. It also includes taking things away from you, damaging your stuff, stealing your money, and taking your friends away from you. It can make you feel scared, lonely, and unhappy. It can also make you feel like something is wrong with you. You might want to stop going to school or other places where the bully hangs out, like the soccer field, the swimming pool, the ice rink, whatever. That's not fair because you miss out on what you want to do.

If you're trying to cope with a bullying problem, you need to know that you're not alone.

Almost everyone's been bullied at one time or another — even the bullies themselves. There are probably people at your school who are going through the exact same thing you are, maybe even because of the same person. The only reason why you don't know about it is because they aren't telling you. Bullying is not something people like to talk about because they're afraid they'll be seen as wimps or losers — which is totally untrue. The reason it's not true is because it's *not your fault*. That's important. You are not doing the bullying, someone else is. You did not do or say anything to deserve it. You have a right to feel safe, secure, and protected at school and in your neighbourhood.

If you don't feel safe, reading this book can be the first step towards changing that.






Bullying IOI

Josie thinks that Barb tripped her on purpose, but it was really by accident. Josie slaps Barb and calls her a moron.




Worse than "wasty"?




NOT A GAME

Answers

- I. This is a difference in opinion about what's fair. Just because the referee is an authority figure, it doesn't make this bullying.
- 2. There is no bullying here. But even if Barb had intended to trip Josie, slapping and name-calling wouldn't be an acceptable reaction.
- Kallandra and the other girls in this situation are definitely bullying Alecia, and Alecia shouldn't have to put up with it.
- 4. These brothers seem to have an equal amount of power and to be equally upset. But physical fights are the wrong way to settle arguments and could eventually lead to bullying.
- This is a disagreement. but not bullying. Still, feelings have been hurt and the conflict needs to be resolved.
- 6. Although this isn't really bullying, physical violence is never acceptable, no matter how upset Bart feels.
- This is cyberbullying because the name-calling has been going on for a while. Although Wayne has been trying to ignore it, he is upset.
- Like name-calling, passing insulting notes is a form of bullying if it hurts someone.
- This is definitely bullying. Brit is verbally and physically bullying Christy.
- 10. Making fun of someone's appearance may seem funny at the time, but can be really devastating for the target. This is cyberbullying.
